What experience in improv convinced you that you had made the right career move?

Probably the time I got to improvise with Phil Hartman. I joined the Groundlings (an improv troupe in Los Angeles) where Phil had been a member several years before. I was asked to do a fundraiser with Phil and some other amazing Groundlings - Tim Stack, Jon Lovitz, Mindy Sterling. Dennis Miller (not a Groundling) performed too. I got to do scenes with all of these comedy idols of mine and, after the show, Phil Hartman said I was funny. To be validated by a hero... it was just the best.

How do you prepare for a role?

I n the beginning, I'd go all out to study people in real life, even if I didn't have a role to prepare for. It was just <u>in case</u> I'd have to prepare for a role. It was a real slow start for me, so I had lots of spare time to walk around Venice Beach and observe people. I had a fascination with freaks and weirdos. Nowadays, I still prepare... but I wait for the job offer to come first.

Are your parts often meant to be scene stealers, or is that all you?

I've never set out to "steal a scene." I (like most actors) look for the part that strikes me as most interesting, or the one that I relate to the most. Whenever an actor does that, they tend to give their best performance.

What aspect of writing do you enjoy in comparison to acting?

A great thing about writing is, you always have

evidence of your work. A script may just be gathering dust on a shelf, but you can dust it off anytime and send it to people anytime. I had an instance where something I wrote ten years earlier got made. It was a drama pilot that didn't get picked up, but now I have a DVD as evidence... so there. With acting, you could have the most amazing moment on stage and it evaporates into the ether the minute the lights go out. Another good thing about writing is you can do it on your own, anytime, anywhere, whereas acting requires other actors, a venue and an audience willing to pay to see you.

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while pursuing his degree at USC. It's a remarkable story.

Another big step forward comes in the person of Kevin Sweeney, our Phi Delt brother from DePauw University in Indiana, who is the new property manager of our chapter house. With over 10,000 square feet and 40 men living in, it's a huge job keeping up with rent payments, maintenance, repairs and move-out room inspections, just for starters. It had become clear to the House Corporation that professional property management was a key to taking care of the house in the most organized manner, and Kevin's firm has a stellar 20 year track record as a property manager in Southern California.

As an example of the benefits we have already seen, after a recent rain we had a roof leak in a second-floor bathroom. House Corporation on its own would have been scrambling trying to get this fixed since we had no relationship with a roofer. But Kevin's company routinely deals with every type of vendor a property needs and knows who the quality people are. He had a roofer at the house within three days to fix the leak, which is much faster than we could have lined up the repair on our own.

The cost for this service will be the same as we were previously paying Greek Bill (an online site where live-ins could pay their rent) for far less value.
