

A third-generation homebuilder, Shine has been active in the real estate industry for more than three decades. His strategic growth plan and "Better by Design" approach that focuses on the customer expeirience and quality has led to him being named 2012 Developer



of the Year by top industry trade publication Builder and Developer, and being honored with the Phoenix Award by Builder, the leading media brand in residential construction. He has also previously held positions as managing director at a boutique investment firm and President and Chief Financial Officer at American Beauty Homes. A respected leader who is committed to the professional real estate community, Shine is a 20-year member of the Young Presidents' Organization (YPO/WPO), the Urban Land Institute, the Building Industry Association, and the Leading Builders of America. In 2007, he was asked by the National Association of Home Builders to represent homebuilders on the National Mortgage Roundtable. Shine is a sought-after speaker on national housing topics, and frequently asked to speak as a host of industry conferences and other events. His speaking engagements include the University of Southern California, the Urban Land Institute, the Pacific Coast Builders Conference, and the Big Builder Conference. He has also been featured on numerous media outlets, including Builder, Big Builder, the Wall Street Journal, Reuters, CNN, and CNBC.

It's funny, I actually received these questions



#### As a speaker, which topics do you favor?


I speak frequently on trends in the housing market and the future of the housing market. Because of my initial role with Woodside Homes, I have some good lessons on how to survive a downturn market.

#### Walk the Line

Steve Detrick '83 shared a copy of an old circa 1990 article that the Los Angeles Times and writer Steve Harvey did about "the line:"

"It's a shame to see yet another landmark falling into disrepair in L.A. We're referring to historic Route 901 on Fraternity Row at USC. It's the four-block-long, blue and white stripe that runs on the
